Will this ever be finished?

Early in 2023 moves were made to install a roundabout to meet up with the road from Broad Street Green, Heybridge, through Maypole Road, and onto Langford Road, through the newly built 'Westcombe Park.' This would mean that, coming from Holloway Road, in just 800 yards there would be three roundabouts and a Victorian railway bridge.

There was talk of removing the railway bridge altogether, but protests from your Local History Recorder, local residents and others, (and perhaps the sheer eye-watering cost of

such an idiotic enterprise) led to a re-think.

In a move that baffled and alarmed residents, all the vegetation on the left-hand side of the road going over the bridge towards Heybridge was removed, which not only caused concern about road safety, but afforded us a very unwelcome view of the new housing estate which had, hitherto, been hidden by the trees. Essex Highways informed us:

"Recent clearance of vegetation from the sides of the existing road has raised concerns with the road alignment and embankment slopes. A temporary speed limit has been introduced for extra protection, with additional signage being installed until permanent improvements are completed. The proposed new road alignment is being designed to significantly improve safety, including the introduction of vehicle restraint barriers.

This will involve a period of single lane traffic flow controlled by traffic lights, to keep everyone safe while the required earthworks take place to build the new embankment. Once the new roundabout has been constructed and ready to take traffic, the developer is planning to tie in the northern and southern legs of the new roundabout to the existing road during the school holiday period to minimise disruption. If all goes well with the initial

stage of the works, a road closure will be required to tie in the new road and re-open it to traffic as quickly as possible. We will continue to post information as we receive updates from the developer as their works proceed, including dates of changing traffic management."

The new roundabout is part of the Westcombe Park Development, owned by housebuilder, Bellway Thames Gateway. This development is the second phase of the wider project and covers 188 acres.

Whatever happened to preserving the countryside? We are almost joined to Heybridge now, with ageing and indifferent infrastructure, and this type of over-development in an already over-developed area is devastating for our wildlife, especially ground-nesting birds. We are now one of the most depleted countries in the world for wildlife, but does anyone care?

Parish Council Precept

Parish councils are funded principally by an annual precept. A budget is approved at the January meeting and the net amount is added to Local Council tax which is collected by Maldon District Council. Parish councils do not receive direct Government funding, any additional money relies on funding through grants, loans or public subscription for a particular project.

At the Parish Council meeting in January 2024, councillors agreed a precept of £13,500 for 2024/25. The main items of expenditure include: administration costs, elections, insurance, streetlighting (Langford), cutting the grass, repairing fences, trees surveys and the resulting necessary work to trees at both closed churchyards.

The Parish Council is 50 years old!



The move towards becoming a Parish Council began on 25th October 1967, when Albert Chaplin, Clerk to the Parish Meeting, wrote to the County Council asking that the powers of a Parish Council be conferred on it to allow the Parish Meeting to provide seats and shelters in roads in the village (under Section 1 of the

Parish Council Act of 1957) and to be able to accept gifts (under section 268 of the Local Government Act of 1933. This power was conferred on 13th January 1968 by T.F.J. Collins, Keeper of the Key of the Seal, and L.G. Lewis, Clerk of the County Council and duly sealed.

In a letter of 4th June, 1974, to Maldon District Council, a request was made to unite the villages of Langford and Ulting under a single Parish Council, and this was granted under a Seal on 1st August 1974.

The very first meeting of the Langford and Ulting Parish Council was held in Ulting Old School on 25th September 1974 where the five newly elected Parish Councillors took office: For Langford – Dick J. Pipe, Harry J. Pipe and John G. Slack, and for Ulting – Donald W. Shaw and John R. Haynes.

So, for 50 years your Parish Council has done its best for the villagers it serves. Sadly, many of the powers that Parish Councils once had have been eroded over the years by various governments, but we still give a voice to our parishes and do the best we can to ensure that your wishes and requirements are met. Unfortunately, with the changing fortunes of Maldon Borough (and now District) Council, our wishes and requests have by developers have often been granted, which is most frustrating. However, we do what we can with our local knowledge and that of the history of our two parishes, to minimise the damage.

Your Clerk and I have been to various meetings with Maldon District Council, and there seems to be a wish to bridge the gap and for them to listen to us more. Watch this space...but don't hold your breath!

D-Day – June 6th 1944

Readers may be interested to know that on 6th June this year, to celebrate the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings, our Vice-Chairman, Lester Magness and some friends will be visiting the site, and laying wreaths on the graves of relatives who fought there. They also have a wreath for a Langford boy – John Woolmore – who was also lost (details of this trip will be in the next issue). We will also be laying flowers on the war memorial on this day to commemorate those lost.

Are you ready for the end of analogue landlines?



Essex County Council's Digital Essex team wants to make residents in Langford & Ulting aware that changes are coming to analogue landlines. By 2025, traditional phone lines will be replaced by a digital landline service. This means that calls will be made over a broadband line.

For most residents, this change will be straightforward – you'll also get to keep your phone number. Your telephone provider will contact you before anything changes. It is important to respond and discuss what you need to do to ensure your service won't be affected.

The switch to digital landline services could affect residents who don't have broadband, rely solely on a landline, use a personal alarm, have no mobile signal, or have additional needs.

Letter to the Editor...

I congratulate your Editor, Irene Allen, for her angry, frustrated, but yet self-controlled, front-page article 'The flood that no-one seems to care about' (*Langford & Ulting News*, issue 38, Spring.) I also congratulate the residents of Ulting Lane who step into the breach and work together to try to alleviate the ongoing problems of flooding (as far as they can) so often experienced at the junction of Ulting Lane and the B1019.

As Irene points out, that flooding has happened 'many, many times' in the past, including 1964 when it was impassable and she and I were unable to go to school, so deep was the water. That was probably the year when we kids constructed a bonfire in readiness of Guy Fawke's Night on the field at the back of Nos 1-8, only to wake one morning to find that it was 'marooned', surrounded by water, our fathers being called upon to rescue our construction, wading into the centre in their knee-length wellies, and dragging the wood up to higher ground. (See photo below.)



That was probably the same year and time of year when the end of Ulting Lane was flooded when Irene's brother Alan, Ronnie and Maurice Hayhoe and me, purchased some penny banger fireworks from a shop in Heybridge (Mrs. Parmenter at our shop never allowed us to buy them [or cigarettes] from her) and played 'Sink the Bismarck,' lighting a banger, holding it until it 'fizzed', laid it on the water and then watch it skim across the water, like a torpedo, until it exploded.

In 1960 the rivers broke their banks and flooded what was the cricket pitch (photo below) (now the Museum of Power showground), whilst the other snap (right) shows how far the flood water reached up to the Hanningfield Pumping Station at Langford. (The short-



trousered youngster, top left of the photo, is yours truly.) Note how the building was built on higher ground, calculated to avoid floodwater reaching the station.



That year flood water could be seen approaching Ulting Lane, across the fields as the canal breached its banks, but never quite reaching the houses. Irene mentioned that the flood being 'not practical (or safe) for smaller cars.' That was the case in 1974 when my wife, Maureen and I came to Ulting Lane to see my dad on the occasion of my nan's funeral. We had an MG Midget and were unable to negotiate the flood so we parked at the lay-by/bus stop on the main road and then walked through the undergrowth and hedges via the Booster House [sadly now demolished – Ed] then on to dry land. To access St. Giles' Church for the service we had to divert round to Wickham Bishops, via Spring Lane as, of course, the floods had closed the B1019 at the White Bridge. No change then...

I hope you have enjoyed these memories which are more evidence that Ulting Lane and indeed other parts of the village can fall victim to flood at any time. Patrick Chaplin.

Obituary – Vicky Anfilogoff (1945-2024)



Victoria Elizabeth Heather Silver was born on VE Day – 8th May, 1945 – to Trevor and Ruby Silver. Trevor was still serving in Burma, so Ruby gave birth in Cardiff surrounded by his family. Trevor finally returned from overseas when Vicky was two years old, and her sister, Diana, arrived in 1948.

The family moved from Dagenham to Upminster when Vicky was nine. There

she met Carol and Jackie, who became like sisters to her, and remained great friends for life. They spent many afternoons riding their bikes around the local countryside, often with Diana tagging along, much to Vicky's disgust!

She developed a love of horses which, thankfully, she shared with Diana. Their parents worked hard to get them the pony they dreamed of – a mare called Topper – who soon gave birth to a foal they called Syeda. Vicky attended technical college and worked as a window dresser in the local department store. She then became a Personal Assistant in London.

The family were very involved with Upminster Rugby Club, and it was here that Vicky met John Tarrington, whom she married. They moved to a larger house in 1981, but sadly, the marriage ended a few years later. However, she had twin boys – Anthony and Christopher – and a daughter called Charlotte, so her family was complete.

Always one to enjoy a new challenge, Vicky started working as a receptionist in the local doctor's surgery, where she met her second husband, Michael Anfilogoff, the consultant. He reintroduced her to her love of horses and through this shared interest, one of many, their relationship developed. They eventually bought a house in Bulphan, a small village, where they could keep their horses round the corner.

They had a wonderful life together as they had so many shared hobbies — music, bridge, travelling, to name but a few—and, of course, most importantly, good food and fine wine!

In 1999 they moved to Fords Farm in Langford with stables attached – their dream home. Vicky soon became deeply involved in village life, including the Langford Ladies' Circle, and the Art Show, and she spent over 20 years as Secretary to the Village Hall Committee. Of course, being Vicky, she ended up on many other committees and indeed spearheaded a campaign against a local developer, and stopped us having a housing estate in the village.

Over the years Vicky and Michael had 12 grandchildren between then, all of whom they adored – they were loving, involved grandparents who loved nothing more than being surrounded by their family.

Michael was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer in October 2008, and sadly passed away in March 2009. Although Vicky was heartbroken, she continued with her typical resolve, and in the summer travelled to Lincolnshire with her daughter Charlotte to pick up her little bundle of joy, her Cockapoo, Remus. He gave her the lift she needed and was obviously popular with the grandchildren too!

When all three Langford Parish Councillors resigned at the same time in 2011, I was approached to stand again, as I had been a Councillor some years previously. Vicky and Richard Perry stood as well. Vicky sent out regular Neighbourhood Watch updates and, with the Parish Clerk, Jenny Clemo, began work on the Neighbourhood Plan – a mammoth task.

In 2015 when Parish Council elections were next held, Vicky was re-elected and voted in as Chairman.

Another blow occurred in January 2018 when her beloved sister Diana died suddenly, leaving her shocked and feeling very alone in the world. She picked herself up again, but her health deteriorated. Numerous operations on various joints over the years had taken their toll, and she finally had to concede and start using a wheelchair, which made it impossible to continue living in Fords Farmhouse. She found a house, literally across the road to move to, but once again in true Vicky style, she didn't do things by halves. An operation on her knee coincided with her moving date, leaving her bemused children overseeing the move and frantically trying to organise the house before she returned from hospital.

Although Vicky made great efforts, she never walked again, and life became harder, and she was forced her to retire from the Parish Council. She continued to battle, but eventually realised she was unable to cope, despite the help of friends and relatives, and so moved into St. Joseph's Nursing Home in Danbury, where she was happy and well looked after.

Sadly, another infection forced her into Broomfield Hospital, where she died on 24th April. Her funeral was at Chelmsford Crematorium on Tuesday 28th May, where I was honoured to be asked to take the service – a privilege to be able to help, one last time, a great friend, a brilliant champion of local causes, and a wonderful Chairman of the Parish Council. Our great consolation is that she is now reunited with Michael, and all those she has loved. Rest in peace Vicky, and thank you for all you did for us.

Museum of Power, Langford

Have you ever thought of volunteering at this incredible little museum? The staff and Trustees are working hard to make this a venue of interest to everyone, and a place of education for children. They have recently received a grant of £280,933 from Arts Council England, for some key access improvements, a new bicycle shelter, and much more. 'Carlton, the Human Hairpin'


Have you ever heard of this man? I doubt it unless you were about in 1923, but the *Essex Newsman* of 7th April of that year waxed lyrical about him:

"Few people know that Carlton, the famous comedian and illusionist who is appearing with great success at the



Regent Theatre, Chelmsford, this week, at one time drove pigs from Hatfield Peverel to Chelmsford market. As a lad, he acted as a drover for his uncle, Mr. Lucking, of Hatfield. Now he is a 'star,' and last week he was at the London Palladium. Carlton...is a nephew of Mr. Walter Grout, farmer, of Stock Hall, Ulting. He is creating a great impression at the Regent and his burlesque on spiritualism and hypnotism, to say nothing of his uncanny card manipulation, is causing keen enjoyment. The enterprising management of the Regent are to be congratulated."

Known as 'The Human Hairpin' Carlton – full name Arthur Carlton Phelps (1881-1942) – was one of the best comedy magicians, and card manipulators of the early 20th century and certainly one of the highest paid, earning the equivalent of over £50,000 a week at the height of his fame. He was tall and thin and accentuated his height with a wig to make his head appear elongated. He wore black tights and would speak in a falsetto voice. His nickname came about as he used to ask a



member of the audience: "How would you like me for a hairpin?" as he could bend in half as part of his act.

When he first wore his unusual costume, the audience howled with laughter, and it was perhaps this that gave him his comedic magician moniker. The following week he was top-billing at £3/week.

Aside from card and conjuring tricks, he also performed some escapology and 'sham' hypnotism, and a bit of mind-reading. He was also, it seems, capable of stretching his body out to increase his height (which was 6' 2½") by as much as six further inches – a feat he likened to being stretched out on a rack.

Sadly, he died impoverished following the decline of the music halls and is buried in Highgate Cemetery in London. His daughter, Marie, instigated The Magic Circle Carlton Comedy Award in 1989, which is still presented for outstanding comedy in magic (the late Paul Daniels won this award in 2012.)

Serious outbreak of smallpox in Langford & Ulting

No, don't be alarmed, this was the heading in the *Chelmsford Chronicle* of 6th July 1894 which noted:

(Within the last few days a serious outbrook of

'Within the last few days, a serious outbreak of smallpox has occurred at Ulting, Langford, Woodham Walter, Maldon and Heybridge. In all there are about 20 cases. A farmhouse on the Langford estate [Ravens – Ed] is being used as a hospital, and a large shed has been erected at Maldon to accommodate about 20 persons. On Monday Dr. Thresh [Medical Officer of Health for Essex – Ed] went to London to make arrangements, if possible, for further accommodation for patients if it is required... His fears of the introduction of the disease have, unhappily, been only too fully justified.'

The first case was that of a man living in Mill Road, who was in charge of a barge laden with London manure, which he had unloaded somewhere below Harwich. The other cases all arose from this imported case, and were of a mild form. They were all isolated, and the proper disinfection and fumigation of the houses was carried out by the Local Authority.

The Church Magazine of August 1894 noted: 'July 1894 proved an unusually sad one for Langford, this parish in common with one or two of the neighbouring ones has suffered from an alarming outbreak of smallpox, only, we deeply regret to have to add, it has suffered far more severely than most; it was found, when too late, that the late Joseph Moss, whose death was announced last month, was suffering, not from blood poisoning as was imagined, but from a very virulent form of suppressed smallpox, caught, no-one knows how; unfortunately nearly all those who saw or came into contact with the deceased took the complaint, and had to be at once removed to the temporary hospital, consisting of the two cottages in the Park, kindly lent by the Hon. Mrs. Byron. Temporary isolation wards were set up in Heybridge as numbers increased (the chimneys of Woodfield Cottages are in the background).



In August 1894 the 'Infectious Hospital' was broken up as there were no more cases of smallpox. All the convalescents who had survived the outbreak had returned to their homes. It was, however, a miracle that more people did not die considering they were exposed to a great danger.

Thankfully, apart from a laboratory accident in 1978 that infected two people (one of whom died), natural smallpox cases were eradicated in Britain in 1934. Now we only have Covid to contend with...or whatever the future holds for us!

News from St. Giles' Church, Langford



Well, at long last, the people of the United Benefice of Heybridge with Langford, and All Saints, Maldon, have a new priest. The Revd. Heather Ann Atkinson (shown below with the Venerable Jonathan

Croucher, Archdeacon of Chelmsford, and the Rt. Revd. Dr. Guli Francis-Degani, the Lord Bishop of Chelmsford, was licenced and installed Priest-in-Charge on February 22nd in All Saints Church, Maldon. The service began by the Area Dean, Revd. Peter Begley, welcoming the congregation. During the service, all the Churchwardens from the various



churches presented Heather with tokens of her office. Not one to wait about. she instigated the '50 days of prayer' to run from Easter to Pentecost in each of her churches. This meant 12 days of prayer from 6

p.m.-7 p.m. in All Saints, Maldon, St. George's, Heybridge Basin, St. Giles', Langford, and St. Andrew's, Heybridge. For those of you who are quicker at numbers than me, yes, four churches and 12 days means 48 days, but there have been a couple added on at the end to make up the time!


